COURSE OVERVIEW

Explores time and space in the creation, perception, exhibition, and performance in contemporary art practice: audio, film, performance, and visual art. Examines experimental and traditional art forms, historical and contemporary theories, and collaborations across a variety of creative and cultural contexts.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

- Develop creative thinking skills
- Introduction to visual literacy
- Improve perceptive and analytical skills with focus on photography, sound, performance, and conceptual art
- Develop craft / making skills in a variety of media
- Understand relationship between form and content - art and its expressive, political, social and cultural implications
- Expand your notion of what art is and can be
- Inspire further research and other creative pursuits

- Come to every class prepared to learn, work, listen, watch, and participate.
- Complete all assignments on time. Students are always permitted, and encouraged, to consider re-doing assignments for which they did not receive a satisfactory grade. - Check your e-mail regularly for updates on project specs, due dates, and grades. It is also an excellent way to communicate with each other to discuss technical and conceptual problems and challenges.
- As a general rule of thumb: for every classroom hour you should spend an additional 2 hours outside of class each week (minimum). For this course, that means you should spend a minimum of 5 hours working outside of class each week.
- Remember being treated fairly does not mean being treated equally. Each student needs different kinds of criticism and encouragement to succeed.

ATTENDANCE POLICY

This is a studio class and much of the work done in this class is done during class time. Attendance is mandatory and crucial to your success. You can miss two classes during the semester, preferably with excused absences. After this, further absences will adversely affect your final grade. Your third absence will lower your final grade by 1/3 letter grade. Every absence after that reduces your grade by another 1/3 letter. You are expected to be physically and mentally present and on time. If you know in advance that you will be unable to attend a particular class, or that you will be late, please leave advance notice with your instructor to register an excused absence. Students are responsible for all missed material. The professor will not provide notes for students for missed classes. Tardy arrivals or early departures, unless authorized by the instructor, count as ½ an absence.

Project Statements

600-800 words (~1.5-2 pages, Times New Roman, 12pt. font, single-spaced)

Write an individual project statement for each project discussing your process both as an individual and a group (when applicable), the way it addressed your intentionality, choice of materials, and presentation.

- Must be submitted (in print) on due date of each project.
- With group projects, each student must submit an individual project statement.

Consider: Process means an examination of how you made decisions about your work, why you chose one path and not another, why you kept something, or discarded something both individually and as a group dynamic. What was the original idea and how did it evolve over the course of the project? How did the media enhance or inhibit your process and flow of the conceptual direction? How did the collaborative process evolve? What were the strengths and weaknesses of working collaboratively? Why did you present the work the way you did? Use spell check and proof read.

Idea Book

Please keep a sketchbook or notebook for this class. Spend at least ten minutes each day writing, drawing, brainstorming, examining and/or reflecting on what you are thinking, feeling, sensing, experiencing, interested in, observing etc. Bring this book to class, and to individual meetings with me. Keep in mind I will be reading parts so don't write something you'd be embarrassed to have me read.
