COURSE OVERVIEW

This course explores techniques of non-photographic Digital Imaging, and the use of the computer as both medium and tool in digital art & design production. Students will work with a range of software, hardware, and tools with an emphasis on graphic design principles and physical outputs.

The emphasis of this semester's course takes the form of a real-world public art commission. Our class has been selected by Ent Credit Union to propose, develop, fabricate, and install a mural in the University Center's Ent Credit Union Branch. More details about budget, timeline, and deliverables will be provided. Topics/technical skills we will cover include: 3D modeling, vector graphics, Digital Fabrication (laser cutting, 3D printing), publication design/layout, and creation of professional presentations.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

- Improve your conceptual and technical understanding of digital media.
- Give you hands on experience with digital tools and techniques.
- Work with a variety of digital inputs and physical outputs.
- Introduce you to methods of digital fabrication.
- Gain real-world applied design experience.
- Provide opportunities for collaboration, experimentation, and group learning.
- Introduce you to a plethora of works by historical and contemporary artists woking in the field.
- Expand your notion of what art is and can be.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

- Come to every class prepared to learn, work, listen, watch, and participate.
- Complete all assignments on time. Students are always permitted, and encouraged, to consider redoing assignments for which they did not receive a satisfactory grade. A re-do must be completed one week after the unsatisfactory grade. A re-do does not guarantee a higher grade, but it is impossible to receive a lower grade for such efforts.
- Participation in class, constructive response during group critiques, and discussion of relevant readings.

- Check your e-mail regularly for updates on project specs, due dates, and grades. It is also an excellent way to communicate with each other to discuss technical and conceptual problems and challenges.
- As a general rule of thumb: for every classroom hour you should spend an additional 2 hours outside of class each week (minimum).

IDEA BOOK

Please keep this in a sketchbook or notebook. Spend at least ten minutes each day writing, drawing, brainstorming, examining and/or reflecting on what you are thinking, interested in, observing etc. Make notes, and plan projects on paper before using digital tools. Bring this book to class, and to individual meetings with me.
